## Interlibrary Loan - ILL

*Are you searching for a particular item? Can't find it?*

*Have you tried searching Pembroke Public Library's iBistro Search Catalog and Virtual Catalog and still no luck?*

*What next?* As a member of the SAILS Library Network, you are able to request material outside the network utilizing the Interlibrary Loan (ILL) System. "Outside the network" includes anywhere in the United States. This service is funded through your tax dollars by the Massachusetts Library System (MLS) for its member libraries (SAILS) and their users.

*What is an Interlibrary Loan (ILL)?* An Interlibrary Loan is any item not available in your local library, SAILS member libraries, or the Virtual Catalog Network. Any registered library patron in good standing in a Massachusetts Library System (MLS) library may

request an item through Interlibrary Loan.

*How do I submit a request?* For material that you wish to borrow, search our library's catalog iBistro first and then the Virtual Catalog to be sure the item you want is not accessible here. To avoid delays, you may wish to consult a librarian to confirm that the item is not available in the library system.

For copies of magazine or newspaper articles, consult a librarian to make sure the article is not available in our library's periodical collection or online in a full-text database.

To submit a request, ask for an Interlibrary Loan request form at the main circulation desk. These

forms are also located at each public catalog iBistro computer.

For faster service, please supply accurate and complete information about the requested item, along with the source of the information. The more information you provide, the better chance we have of finding the material for you!

If you have a specific deadline, please include the date on your request form. Interlibrary Loan staff will try to obtain the material by this particular date.

Once you have submitted a request, we will process the online request form and forward your request to the Massachusetts Library System Interlibrary Loan Processing Center located at the Thomas Crane Public Library in Quincy, Massachusetts.

**What does it cost?** Most Interlibrary Loans are free! However, the Pembroke Public Library pays the postage to mail items back to the owning library within reason. We always request materials from libraries that do not charge loan fees. Occasionally, some libraries will charge a fee to borrow an item. Notification and payment in advance must be received in order to request this item. The patron is responsible for all overdue charges and for any replacement charges if an item is damaged or lost. There is usually no charge for copied materials.

**How long does it take?** The time it takes for an Interlibrary Loan to arrive depends upon the availability and location of the item. It generally takes about two weeks to fill a request. Because there are so many variables at work, it's best to plan ahead when requesting materials.

**What materials are available?** The Interlibrary Loan Department in Quincy can get just about anything! Many books, including foreign language and large print materials, out-of-print fiction and non-fiction, and government documents can be borrowed from other libraries across the United States. Music, audiobooks,

DVDs, videos, and more are also available for loan. Microfilm materials may be borrowed for in-library use. The Pembroke Public Library has a microfilm reader located in the History Room to view loaned microfilm. Copies of magazine and newspaper articles may be requested in accordance with copyright laws.

**What materials are not available through Interlibrary Loan (ILL)?** Reference and genealogy materials are not generally available for loan, but sometimes a library will photocopy relevant pages in response to a request. For any genealogical request, it is always helpful to provide a specific name and date to help us track down your request.

New materials that are on order or in use, entire issues of periodicals, multiple copies for a "book club," recent bestsellers, textbooks, tests and proprietary materials, and old, rare, or valuable materials are *not* generally available through interlibrary loan.

**What is the loan period?** Loan periods for books and other borrowed materials vary depending on the loan period set by the lending li-

brary. On average, the loan period is approximately 14 days. Renewals are usually not allowed. Occasionally, renewals may be granted with at least one week's notice and the owning library's permission.

**Are there any restrictions?** Yes, there are some restrictions. You may only submit up to 5 requests at a time. Also, lending libraries determine any conditions regarding the use of their materials. When we borrow materials from another library, we agree to abide by their rules. Sometimes, other libraries will lend items with special conditions such as no renewals or in-library use only, or a shorter loan period.

When your item arrives, we will notify you by phone or email. Magazine and newspapers articles can be sent to your email address, or we can print out a copy for you to take home.

**How do I return materials?** Return all materials to the Pembroke Public Library only. Please leave the white Interlibrary Loan Library label on the cover and return to the main circulation desk.

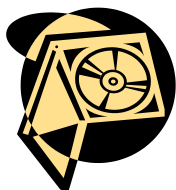

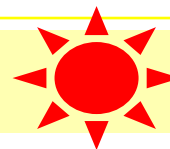

# WORLDS OF FUN FOR THE SUMMER



It's that time of year again! When the school year winds down and the temperature rises, we're gearing up for the annual Summer Reading Program. This year's theme for preschoolers and elementary school students is:



The corresponding theme for teens entering grade 7 and up is:



The Pembroke Library has a fun-filled line-up of performances and activities designed to excite kids about reading all summer long.

The first step in joining the fun is to register. On the library's website, [pembrokepubliclibrary.org](http://pembrokepubliclibrary.org), you'll find a link to register for the Summer Reading Program, along with a tutorial to guide you through the process. Kids may also register in person at the library. Registration and the program begin concurrently on Monday, June 27<sup>th</sup>, and the registration period closes on August 15<sup>th</sup>. Starting June 27<sup>th</sup>, participants may use the reading logs available at the library to keep track of the hours (or portions thereof) they spend reading. Reading in any form is acceptable, including graphic novels, listening to audiobooks, and reading together as a family. Youngsters who have read at least three hours in a week may present their logs at the library and choose a small prize

from our treasure chest. Readers who meet or exceed the three hour mark will be entered into raffles for weekly prizes and the grand prize. Winners will be randomly selected, but more weekly entries will result in more chances at the grand prize, a \$100 gift certificate to the Hanover Mall! The Summer Reading Program culminates on Friday, August 19<sup>th</sup> with an ice cream social at 1:00 p.m., where we will distribute certificates and announce the grand prize winners.

In keeping with the theme of One World, Many Stories, we have a great line-up of "worldly" performers for kids aged four and up. Each performance will be on a Tuesday, and the tickets to each show will be available one week in advance. The opener will be "**Travel the World in Tales and Tunes**" by **Mary Jo Maichack**, a Minstrel Storyteller who combines songs, folktales, and dance from around the world. The show will be held on July 5<sup>th</sup> at 1:00 p.m. with tickets available starting on Tuesday, June 28<sup>th</sup>. On July 26<sup>th</sup> Otha Day brings an **African Drum Circle** to Pembroke at 10:30 a.m. Participants will learn to express themselves and build community through rhythm and percussion. Tickets will be available on July 19<sup>th</sup>. Lastly, meet unusual "**Animals Around the World**" in a presentation by the Creature Teachers from Littleton on August 16<sup>th</sup> at 11:30 a.m. Tickets will be available on August 9<sup>th</sup>.

On Friday July 8<sup>th</sup> and August 5<sup>th</sup> at 10:30 a.m., Miss Jessica will be hosting **dance parties!** She will

teach all the latest group dances, from the Funky Chicken to the Cupid Shuffle. The parties are open to ages 5 and up and no registration is required. Star Wars fans aged 7 and up are invited to a **Star Wars Party**, which will celebrate the craze with games, crafts, and prizes. The Star Wars Party is tentatively scheduled for July 21<sup>st</sup>.

On Friday July 15<sup>th</sup> at 2:30 p.m. the library will hold an **Exotic Stuffed Animal Show** for all ages. Prizes will be awarded to the cuddliest, most exotic, and best in show. We will also be offering "**Read to Your Dog**," twenty minute sessions of reading practice with a therapy-certified dog. Check with the library for date and times.

The Teen Advisory Group (TAG) is hosting life-sized games for kids. Play **Life-Sized Candyland** on Thursday July 28<sup>th</sup> at 4:00 p.m. and **Life-Sized Clue** on Thursday August 4<sup>th</sup>. All are welcome to play the ongoing game, "Where in the World is TAG?" Each week throughout the program look for a photo of a TAG member and guess which country they are in for a chance to win prizes.

Beginning July 5<sup>th</sup>, **drop in story-times** for children aged two and up will be held on Mondays and Tuesdays at 10:30 a.m. **Baby Lapsit**, for toddlers ages 6 through 24 months, will be held on Wednesdays at 10:30. No pre-registration is necessary for these programs. **The Lego Club** for ages 7 and up continues to meet during the summer on Thursdays, July 7<sup>th</sup> and

August 11<sup>th</sup>, at 4:00 p.m. **Introductory Spanish** classes for children aged 5 -7 will be held on five consecutive Wednesdays beginning July 13<sup>th</sup> at 11:30 a.m. Pre-registration is required for the Spanish classes and will begin on July 1<sup>st</sup>.

We will be showing **Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows Part 1** on Wednesday July 15<sup>th</sup> at 4 p.m. in the program room. All are invited (subject to parental determination of age appropriateness), and welcome to bring snacks. No sign-up is required.

Come **decorate paper lantern hot air balloons** to hang at home. This craft project is open to ages 5 and up and will be held on Thursday July 14<sup>th</sup> at 2:00 p.m. Register on or after July 1<sup>st</sup>.

This year we will hold a **Lego Creations contest**. The theme of the contest is "Creative Worlds" and it is open to kids aged five and up. Entries will be accepted during the week of August 1<sup>st</sup> and should consist of original art assembled from Legos.

In addition to the wide array of offerings for younger kids, plenty of activities specifically designed for teens will be offered. Teens will have similar chances to win prizes based on their reading hours, and can also share their reading selections on Facebook by linking their accounts upon registration. Watch our Summer Reading Program commercial on YouTube by searching for pembrokepubliclibrary. Here you will also find a tutorial demonstrating how to register for the program.

TAG will hold a **Card Game Night** on Thursday July 14<sup>th</sup> at 5:00 p.m., where teens will play such favorites as Flux, Magic: The Gathering, and Apples to Apples. They may also play the ongoing "Where in the World is TAG?" game described above. Teens are invited to dress as characters in the Life-Sized Candyland and Clue games being held on July 28<sup>th</sup> and August 4<sup>th</sup>.

Starting July 11<sup>th</sup>, teens aged 11 – 18 may participate in a weekly **Zumba** class on Mondays at 11:30 a.m. Pre-registration for individual classes is required and will begin a week prior to each class. Teens interested in **Manga** should plan to attend a

workshop on August 13<sup>th</sup> at 1:00 p.m. Andrew Fish will discuss the history of Manga and present hands-on instruction on Manga drawing. No registration is required for the Manga workshop. Both of these programs are funded by our LSTA grant.

All teens are also invited to enter the Lego Creations "Creative Worlds" Contest. Entries must be original artwork (not a fully assembled lego set, although individual components may be used) made entirely of legos. Prizes will be awarded according to age category.

Teen volunteers are needed to assist with the summer reading program. Please pick up a volunteer form at either desk if you're interested.

The fun begins on June 27<sup>th</sup>, so remember to log on or come in to register, keep track of your reading hours, and join in all the exciting events!

## Pembroke Wins Four at the MLA PR Awards!

Pembroke Public Library walked away from the Massachusetts Library Association's annual conference with four Public Relation Awards. The biennial award winners were chosen by a panel of independent judges from the public relations, press, and library fields. Evaluation criteria included graphic design, originality, and presentation. Entries were submitted for 17 categories, including

brochures, community reading programs, social media, and Websites. Pembroke won 1st place in Social Networking, Media Presentation, and Newsletter categories, and 3rd place in the Town Read category for the 2010 Three Cups of Tea Pembroke Reads program.

Pembroke continues to be recognized for the efforts put forth by their hardworking and talented staff, continuing to receive these

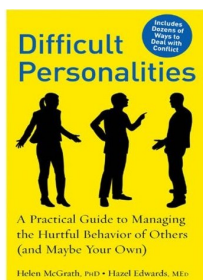
prestigious public relations awards as they have previously in 2009 and 2007.

## Staff Picks - Book Recommendations From The PPL

Library staff are frequently asked if we've read any good books lately. With each issue of this newsletter we aim to answer that question and promote some of the wonderful books on our shelves. This summer's staff picks come from the lovely and hilarious Heather, who keeps us all smiling.

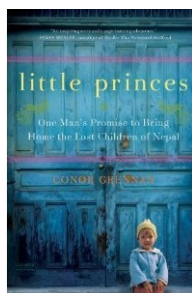
Heather has selected three thought-provoking books from the non-fiction shelves. The first is *Difficult Personalities* by Helen McGrath and Hazel Edwards, which gives insight into personality differences and how they can affect relationships. It offers eye-opening descriptions of the introvert and extrovert personality types. Heather recommends this informative and well-written book to anyone who is coping with or helping a loved one to deal with anxiety.



Another suggestion from the self-help section is *Survival of the Soul* by Lisa Williams. According to

Heather, "This book offers evidence of the afterlife. Lisa Williams gives answers to questions that we all have, such as the transition after death and reincarnation. She hopes to convey that death is not something to be feared and certainly not the end. I found it to be an interesting book to ponder, and whether or not you are a believer in the afterlife the book is written in an approachable way."

Her final recommendation is *Little Princes: one man's promise to bring home the lost children of Nepal* by Conor Grennan. This is the story of a young man whose volunteer work at an orphanage in Nepal leads to a commitment to reunite the youngsters with their families after he discovers that they



have been victims of child trafficking. With such a serious subject, Heather says, "it could be a downer, but not so. It reads like a novel and shows what one person is capable of." This inspiring book is a great read.

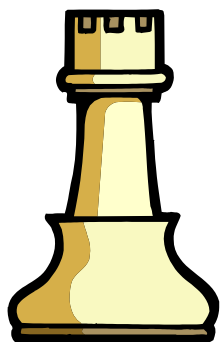

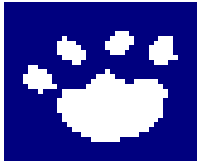

# LIBRARY ELF

*keeping tabs on your library material*

Library Elf is the latest gadget the Pembroke Public Library is offering to its patrons. This neat little feature is the equivalent of putting a ribbon around your finger to give yourself a little reminder. Signing up is a snap.

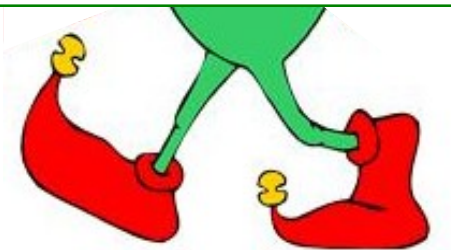
On the Pembroke Public Library web site, click on the sign-up for Library Elf. There are only four easy steps to follow. First you will be asked to enter your email address, then to pick an Elf password. On this same page is a box for your first and last name. Step one, done. Step two will ask for your library card information. Highlighted for you is the MA Sails Library Network, which includes the Pembroke Public Library. Your actual barcode number is added next. The final area to be filled in is for your pin. Your

pin is usually the last four digits of your phone number. Hit the save button. Step two, done. The next screen is just a check that your information is correct. At this point you have the option of adding another card to the Elf. This is great for parents who have library cards for their kids. Just go in and add your child's library card information and it all will be in one easy access account. Step three is where you choose your reminder method: email, text, or RSS feed. The first section is for those of you who would like to get an email. Choose your preferences here. Under email is the text alert sign up. For text messages sent to your phone, choose this option. Please make sure you already have texting features on your phone, because standard charges would apply. Once you have chosen how and where you will receive your alerts,

step four is just to confirm all your information. Library Elf sign up is done.

The Library Elf is a great feature to have. If you lose your receipt from the library, no matter. The Elf will let you know when your items are due. If you are juggling the family's cards with different due dates for different members, the Elf will now keep track of all your family's due dates. No more overdues! Not only will you be notified when items are due, but also if a hold becomes available for you, the Elf will let you know.

Sign-up is easy to do, but if you have any questions or need help, please just ask and any one of our staff will be more than happy to help you.

## Museum Passes

Pembroke Public Library is very fortunate to be able to offer museum passes to its patrons. All passes offer a discounted rate of admission into the museums. We have a great variety from which to choose. We have something for everyone. Passes available to our patrons include the Children's Museum, Institute of Contemporary Art, Isabella Stuart Gardner, Museum of Fine Arts, and the Museum of Science all located in Boston. Unfortunately the New England Aquarium pass is not available during the summer months, but during the fall/winter/spring it is available. Closer to home, located in Norwell, is the South Shore Natural Sci-

ence Center. Heading a little further south you have two more choices: the Plymouth Plantation, or the Heritage Museum and Gardens located in Sandwich. The Massachusetts Parks Pass is a good choice also because it offers parking at a lot of beaches, parks, and ponds located all over the state. Always worth the drive is Roger Williams Park Zoo in Rhode Island.

A typical family can save quite a bit of money by reserving a pass. Speaking of which, reserving a pass is easy. You can go to our website at [www.pembrokepubliclibrary.org](http://www.pembrokepubliclibrary.org) and do it yourself. If you prefer

you can give us a call (781) 293-6771, and we will be more than happy to reserve your pass. If you are in the library for a visit ask at the desk to reserve your pass. The process is such a simple one. Bring in your library card, pick a date and that's it! Your pass is reserved. To pick up your pass, you may come to the library the day before or the morning of your reservation and bring your library card of course.
