Bodie Ghost Town - State of Arrested Decay

Bodie is an original mining town from the late 1800's. What's left today stands in a state of "arrested decay" which means the buildings are protected but not restored. The "town" is maintained by the California State Parks System.

Old Main Street in Bodie was said to be nearly one mile long with traffic that was continuous and enlivening!

The streets are quiet now.

Bodie still has its wicked climate, but with the possible exception of an occasional ghostly visitor, its badmen are all in their graves. Only about five percent of the buildings it contained during its 1880s heyday still remain. Today, it stands just as time, fire and the elements have left it — a genuine California gold-mining ghost town. Designated a state historic park in 1962, it is now maintained in a state of "arrested decay."

Hockomock Digital Photographers (HDP) is in its ninth season of not only providing photo opportunities for anyone interested but also of exhibiting their images in local libraries.










Chronicles from the Local History Room:

The "What Not," March 1885

The Pembroke Reading Club, which we looked at in-depth in the last newsletter, operated in town from December 1874 to the late 1880s. In addition to spreading the love of reading in Pembroke and helping establish a free public library for residents of the town, club members compiled their own publication called the "What Not," which was read aloud at meetings. Although the club referred to the "What Not" as a publication, it was not actually printed; rather, it was compiled of handwritten notes and newspaper clippings.

The issue we have in our collection, dated March 31, 1885, can be assumed to be typical of other issues of the "What Not." Newspaper clippings relating to different aspects of reading and literature have been pasted onto lined paper and are arranged thematically; for example, one page contains the heading "Something about a few noted people," under which are pasted several clippings about famous writers. Other newspaper clippings include short jokes and anecdotes; poems, one of which is by Charles Dickens; and a brief article about the statue of Washington in Boston's Public Garden. The issue also includes handwritten notices about both the club itself and local events; they note that there will be a "dramatic cut" to the club's budget and that there will be a special Easter service at St. Andrew's Church in Hanover.

Another interesting note is that this issue is only four pages long including the cover. Enthusiasm for the club had waned by this point; it is probable that older issues of the "What Not" were longer, as they were compiled at a time when there was both more interest in the club and more members to contribute to the publication.




