
Do you have to participate in all of the fundraising activities? *No, your time commitment is valued and always flexible.*

Pembroke Reads 2016 - The Martian



Spring once again brings us the annual Town Read selection for Pembroke, and this year's choice is *The Martian* by Andy Weir. Events have been planned for both adults and children using Mars and outer space as inspiration. Check out the listing below for events planned thus far. Keep an eye on our website calendar of events for the latest offerings.

Come in and check out a copy of this popular novel! *The Martian* is available in paperback, regular print, large print and audiobook formats.

Galactically-themed stories for young people are also available. The town-wide read for elementary students in Grades 2 and up is *Cakes in Space: A Not So Impossible Tale* by Phil-

ip Reeve and Sarah McIntyre. In this actionpacked, fun-to-read (alone or aloud) story a young girl and her robot friends battle cake monsters in outer space. The selection for middle-schoolers in Grades 6 and up is The Silver Six by A.J. Lieberman and Darren Rawlings, a graphic novel about a group of brave and resourceful orphans defending themselves against evil villains. For teens (Grades 9 and up), the town-wide read will be The Prom Goer's Interstellar Excursion by Chris McCoy. In this hilarious story a daring teen hitches a ride into outer space to rescue his prom date who has been kidnapped by aliens. Any of these stories may be enjoyed by all ages. Staff Picks

Staff Picks

Wondering what the staff here at the library is reading?

These are some of our favorites!

The staff picks for this issue are offered by our youth services librarian Miss Melissa, who manages to make significant time for reading every day in the midst of a very full life. Melissa's ability to prioritize reading makes her a tremendous reader's advisory resource, especially in the world of young adult and children's literature. She is exceptionally well-read and always eager to share her impressions of books. Here, Melissa offers her reviews of several coming-of-age novels which showcase the reciprocal value of intergenerational relationships.

Her first selection is *Listen*, *Slowly* by Thanhha Lai, a "beautifully written novel that elegantly presents the Vietnamese culture and language in an endearing way with the wit, vulnerability, angst, and passion of a middle school girl. Mai (or Mia, to her American friends) is looking forward to her summer at the beach and getting to know HIM when her parents crush her with the news that instead she must accompany her grandmother to Vietnam to 'connect with her roots' while her grandmoth-

er discovers the story behind her husband who went missing during the Vietnam War. Mai is sour about putting her plans on hold and is whisked away to a foreign country she's only ever seen on PBS specials. As she begins to reluctantly adjust to life in her grandmother's small village, she must find a way to balance her own past and desires with her family's past and present. Mai and the author have plenty to teach the readers about culture, family, friendship, and acceptance in this sweet summer story."

Those of us who have observed the growing popularity of graphic novels and have considered sampling one may want to start with Melissa's next choice, Sunny Side Up by Jennifer L. Holm. "Sunny's story is fun for young and old readers alike with heart-breaking moments for those who look beyond the spoken words and begin to unravel the mystery of why Sunny must spend the summer with her grandfather. With references to classic heroes and cute allusions to seventies culture, this book manages to stay relevant while exposing young readers to a different time. The fantastic comparisons drawn between Sunny's life and her view on comic books and other experiences make this a deep read as well as an entertaining one."

Melissa's final choice is *Hurt Go*

Happy by Ginny Rorby, the story of a teenager named Joey who has been deaf for seven years and has felt like an outsider in her own life for much of that time. Her mother's refusal to allow her to learn Sign Language has left her feeling increasingly isolated. When Joey meets a grandfatherly figure and his chimpanzee, Sukari, things begin to change. The pair communicates with Sign Language and Joey starts to discover a world of possibilities, with loving friends and a way to finally express herself. But trouble lies ahead as Joey and Sukari must fight for happiness and survival from those who don't understand. "Hurt Go Happy explores many tough issues in less than 300 pages with a mix of charming and complex characters, real-life struggles, and a foundation in a true story that compels readers to discover the next event. The boundless love expressed throughout the story is also matched by terrible cruelties, making the story achingly beautiful and real...This is a hidden gem that everyone should have a chance to explore."

Thanks to Miss Melissa for calling our attention to these moving stories of intergenerational bonding that we might have otherwise overlooked. As always, the Staff Picks display on the left side of the library's main reading room features even more suggestions for intriguing reads. Stop in and check it out!





Chronicles from the Local History Room:

"Ship Building on the North River" by Howard Leavitt Horton, 1961





Part of the pamphlet's cover. While the image of the ship is printed, the red and blue background appears to have been hand-colored.

Howard Leavitt Horton (1904-1983) was an artist and writer originally from Hingham. While he worked several different jobs in Boston during his life, including telegraph operator, custodian, and guard, it's clear from the work he left behind that his true passions lay in art, history, and the South Shore. Horton created many watercolor paintings and several local publications, including the serial *New England Chronicle*. Most of his work focused on his hometown and the surrounding area, where he spent much of his life along with his wife Zillah Louise Schurman, their children Howard Richard and Guinevere, and, eventually, seven grandchildren.


Horton compiled the pamphlet in our collection, "Ship Building on the North River," in 1961 in honor of Pembroke's 250th anniversary the following year. He says on the first page that he wanted to create it because Pembroke played a significant part in his life and memories. He mentions a special fondness for Oldham Pond, an interest in local landmarks such as the Brick Kiln Yard, and the desire to increase awareness of lesser-known people in local history. The pamphlet focuses on some of the prominent people, locations, and ships in Pembroke's shipbuilding past. Horton talks in particular about Thatcher Magoun, his family, and his shipyards, as well as those of the Turner and Briggs families.

In the pamphlet, Horton combines his personal reminiscences about the town with his own artwork and excerpts from the L. Vernon Briggs book "Shipbuilding on the North River." The pamphlet was hand typed and printed by Horton on a combination of printing paper and thick, textured watercolor paper. While most of the illustrations are black and white copies, there are two images that appear to have been hand-colored by Horton: the cover picture (shown above) and an inside illustration of the *Helen M. Foster*, which in 1871 became the last ship launched on the North River.


