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# Get More From Your Pembroke Library Card at the Pembroke Public Library



#### ***Bodie Ghost Town - State of Arrested Decay***

*Bodie is an original mining town from the late 1800's. What's left today stands in a state of "arrested decay" which means the*



*buildings are protected but not restored. The "town" is maintained by the California State Parks System. Old Main Street in Bodie was said to be nearly one mile long with traffic that was continuous and enlivening!*

*The streets are quiet now.*

*Bodie still has its wicked climate, but with the possible exception of an occasional ghostly visitor, its badmen are all in their graves. Only about five percent of the buildings it contained during its 1880s heyday still remain. Today, it stands just as time, fire and the elements have left it -- a genuine California*

*gold-mining ghost town. Designated a state historic park in 1962, it is now maintained in a state of "arrested decay."*

## **Pembroke Public Library Mission Statement**

The Pembroke Public Library provides residents of all ages the means to learn throughout their lives; to pursue recreational reading interests; and a place to meet and participate in community discussions.

**Chronicles from the Local History Room:  
Pembroke Reading Club Ledgers, 1876-1887**

Feb. 5th. 1878.

Eighteen members of the club met at Mrs. Loring's, Tuesday evening, Feb. 5th. The secretary, being absent Miss Barstow was appointed for the evening. Mrs. Temple - chairman of Entertainment Committee, - reported; that a Ball would be given soon, by the club, in aid of the proposed Free Public Library. Two hours were then spent in reading the conclusion of 'Hamlet,' which was postponed two weeks ago.

The Pembroke Reading Club was established in December 1874 to share and spread the enjoyment of reading among residents of the town. The club was created after the dissolution of the Female Reading Society; unlike its predecessor, the Reading Club included both men and women as members. Meetings were typically held once a week at different members' homes, usually with between 10 and 25 people present. Meetings began with discussion and voting relative to club business, including the acceptance of new members. This was followed by readings, speeches, and songs performed by members; those who had been assigned to read and failed to do so had to pay a fine of five dollars. Authors the club read frequently included Shakespeare, Tennyson, and Longfellow. In addition to its weekly meetings, the club also held annual parties and picnics. It also had its own librarian; Mrs. Collins was elected unanimously to this position in November 1877, but was replaced by Miss Oldham in 1879 so that the books would be "more accessible to the majority of the club." (The ledger rarely lists first names. "Miss Oldham" was either Mary or Abbie; these sisters were both longtime club members.)


The club was very active in the town's plans to establish a free public library, which is unsurprising given its goal of promoting reading in the town. Many members served on the Free Library Association and donated money and books. The club also held a fundraising ball in March 1878. The library opened later that year in a room on the Burton homestead.

The two Reading Club ledgers contain handwritten meeting minutes from 1876 through 1887. Entries from September 1879 through April 1881 also include discussion questions. Entries stop after December 1887 with no explanation. It's possible that the club disbanded at that time; interest seems to have dwindled in the mid-1880s, as evidenced by less frequent meetings and decreased attendance.







## **TECHNOLOGY... HOW WE HELP**

A part of the Pembroke Public Library's mission statement is to "empower people to find and evaluate information and remain current with the new technology." Our 2011 grant of \$10,000 enabled the library to purchase laptop computers, tablets and e readers for a Technology Lab. In 2015, the Friends again supplied funding for upgrades to the library's technology. The Friends will continue to support this important part of the library's mission with continued funding for enhancements to the library's technology during 2016.

In 2013, The Friends donated the AWE workstation for the Children's room of the library, and it quickly became very popular with the younger children. The library has received partial funding through a grant to purchase the next age group AWE workstation in 2016. An additional grant from the Friends will cover the remaining costs so that more children in two different age groups will be able use this technology.
